



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Pennsylvania American Water Partners with Local Groups for "Wonderful World of Water" Camps

Partnerships provide hands-on environmental education

SCRANTON, Pa. (May 30, 2019) – Pennsylvania American Water today announced two partnerships for the company's annual Wonderful World of Water Camps, to be held in Wilkes-Barre and Peckville this year. The camps are offered free to children of Pennsylvania American Water customers.

Pennsylvania American Water is again partnering with the Lackawanna River Conservation Association for its fifth Water Camp at the Valley Community Library, Peckvilla August 5-8. Registration for both camps is limited to 25 campers. A deposit of \$10 will hold a child's space, and the deposit will be refunded upon arrival at camp.

TIPS FOR PARENTS

In an effort to organize our program so that our children enjoy their experience and remain safe, please review and adhere to the following suggestions:

- Children should be dropped off and picked up at Downtown Arts. 47 North Franklin Street, Wilkes-Barre. A counselor will be there to welcome your child and see your child off.
- · Drop-off time is at 9 a.m.
- · Children will be waiting at the designated pick-up point at 3 p.m.
- · Apply sunscreen and bug spray to your child (and/or send it with them each day). Most of our activities will be outdoors. A hat is also recommended.

· Dress appropriately:

- If it is a chilly day, provide a sweater, sweatshirt (or similar clothing).
- Pack a rain jacket every day.
- · Wear clothing that can get dirty and shoes that can get wet.
- Provide comfortable walking shoes (we will be taking walks) and hikes daily). Shoes should be closed-toe sneakers. Also include a pair of water shoes or extra sneakers for days we are exploring the river and riverbank.
- · You are welcome to pack a change of clothes in a bag, labeled with your child's name, in case they get wet or dirty and are uncomfortable.
- · Two field trips are planned; information will be provided on the days prior to the trips.
- Please pack a brown bag lunch each day; snacks will be provided. Children are asked to bring a "Zero Waste" lunch. Please see attached form for description of a "Zero Waste" lunch.
- · Encourage your child to share the "events of the day" with you. We will work to create a joyful, exciting learning experience for your child. Please encourage his or her enthusiasm!

HOW TO PACK A **ZERO-WASTE LUNCH**



Help reduce waste!

You might be surprised to learn how much of an impact you can have on the environment by packing zerowaste lunches. On average, a schoolage child using a disposable lunch generates 67 pounds of waste per school year. That equates to 18,760 pounds of lunch waste for just one average-size elementary school. Garbage like juice boxes, plastic

bags, plastic utensils, napkins and single use containers like potato chip bags and cans of soup are common contributors. Little gets reused, and most ends up in the landfill.

Zero Waste lunches can help students and parents reduce the amount of trash we generate.

Make the switch: Pack a **ZERO-WASTE** lunch!

Disposable Lunch	ZERO-WASTE Lunch
Sandwiches, fruits and vegetables sealed in plastic bags AND Prepackaged yogurt, apple sauce, pudding, chips, pretzels, cookies, fruit bars, granola bars, cheeses and fruit leathers	Sandwiches and other main dishe fruits, vegetables and treats in reusable containers
Disposable juice boxes, juice pouches, soda cans, water bottles and milk cartons	Beverages in reusable drink containers/thermos
Plastic forks and spoons	Stainless-steel forks and spoons
Paper napkins	Cloth napkins
Brown paper bag or plastic bag to carry lunch	Reusable lunch boxes

BONUS TIP: Children who help plan, prepare and pack their own lunches are more likely to eat their lunch!)
